a celebration of the visual contributions of the bestiary one of the most popular types of illuminated books during the middle ages and an exploration of its lasting legacy brimming with lively animals both real and fantastic the bestiary was one of the great illuminated manuscript traditions of the middle ages encompassing imaginary creatures such as the unicorn siren and griffin exotic beasts including the tiger elephant and ape as well as animals native to europe like the beaver dog and hedgehog the bestiary is a vibrant testimony to the medieval understanding of

animals and their role in the world so iconic were the stories and images of the bestiary that its beasts essentially escaped from the pages appearing in a wide variety of manuscripts and other objects including tapestries ivories metalwork and sculpture with over 270 color illustrations and contributions by twenty five leading scholars this gorgeous volume explores the bestiary and its widespread influence on medieval art and culture as well as on modern and contemporary artists like pablo picasso and damien hirst published to accompany an exhibition on view at the j paul getty museum at the getty center may 14 to august 18 2019

from the bestiaries in the collections of the british library ann payne has culled wonderful illustrations she has linked them with a sampling of the poetry the folk wisdom and the romantic imagination of the formative years of western civilization the antioch review

now in an affordable edition a splendid pageant of the animal kingdom as the middle ages saw it as the 587 colorful images in this magnificent volume reveal animals were a constant and delightful presence in illuminated manuscripts throughout the middle ages they were illustrated not only in bestiaries the compendiums of animal fact and fable that were exceedingly popular in the twelfth and thirteenth centuries but in every sort of manuscript sacred and profane from the gospels to the romance of the rose this book is arranged in manner of a proper bestiary with essays on the medieval lore and iconography of one hundred creatures alphabetized by their latin names from the alauda or lark whose morning song was thought to be a hymn to creation to the vultur whose taste for carrion made it a symbol of the sinner who indulges in worldly pleasures the selection includes a number of creatures that would now be considered fantastic including the griffin the manticore and of course the fabled unicorn

the bestiary is a book of animals the second family bestiary is the most important version this study addresses the work s purpose and audience it includes a critical edition and new english translation and a catalogue raisonne of the manuscripts

first penned in egypt between the 2nd and 4th centuries the physiologus brought together poetic descriptions of animals and their christian allegories translated into a wide range of languages from across north africa and much of europe each version of the physiologus adapted the text in

culturally specific ways that yield fascinating insights for those who delve into this truly global tradition of representing and interpreting animals this edition provides the texts and translations of the only two surviving english versions the old english physiologus from the late 10th century exeter book and the middle english physiologus from the mid 13th century ms arundel 292 as well as translations of a range of latin french and old english sources and analogues underpinned by a commitment to both the fields of medieval studies and animal studies this book provides an accessible introduction to the literary history of the physiologus and the politics of animal representation asking the vital question how can we understand humanity s relationships with non human animals and the environment today without understanding their past

the medieval bestiary was a contribution to didactic religious literature addressing concerns central to all walks of christian and secular life these essays analyze the bestiary from both literary and art historical perspectives exploring issues including kinship romance sex death and the afterlife

this book the first to be written by authors who know about animals is based on a study of 40 manuscripts it shows that bestiaries are not as so often thought mere compendia of old wives tales and religious symbolism but important documents for any serious history of medieval science

this is an english translation of the short version of the french bestiary of pierre de beauvais the original text the physiologus was probably written during the 2nd century in greek then translated to latin and then translated into old french by de beauvais these are stories of animals given as symbols of man s eternal fears and hopes this bestiary can be used as a means of understanding the thought processes of people in the middle ages

beasts factual and fantastic is the first in the medieval imagination series of small affordable books that will draw on manuscript illuminations from the middle ages and early renaissance each volume will focus on a particular theme or subject as represented by medieval artists often as in the case of the imaginary beasts that readers will encounter in this volume artists depicted that which they did not see or know but which was nonetheless shaped by the prevailing beliefs fears and rudimentary science of the time in other cases manuscript illuminators recorded what they indeed did see which centuries later reveals much about the world in which they lived this inaugural volume features vivid and charming details from the wealth of manuscripts in the collections of the j paul getty museum and the british library along with a lively text together both word and image provide an accessible and delightful introduction to the imagination of the medieval world future volumes in this series will cover such topics as costumes portraiture and marginalia among others

this sourcebook serves both as an introduction and a wide ranging reference work for human attitudes to nonhuman animals in latin europe during the middle ages under twelve headings it includes numerous translated passages from latin and vernacular texts that reflect human conceptions and uses of other animals during the period 300 1520 theologians philosophers encyclopaedists bestiaries hagiographers chroniclers huntsmen and writers of agricultural manuals cookbooks and plague treatises all had something to say about the place of nonhuman

animals in their world and their interaction with humans or simply recorded incidentally what they did in their writings all are represented here

a redefinition of the animal s relationship to sound and language in french texts from medieval england the barks hoots and howls of animals and birds pierce through the experience of medieval texts in captivating episodes of communication between species a mandrake shrieks when uprooted from the ground a saint preaches to the animals and a cuckoo causes turmoil at the parliament of birds with his familiar call this book considers a range of such episodes in old french verse texts including bestiaries treatises on language the life of saint francis of assisi and the fables by marie de france aiming to reconceptualize and reinterpret animal soundscapes it argues that they draw on sound to produce competing perspectives forms of life and linguistic subjectivities suggesting that humans owe more to animal sounds than we are disposed to believe texts inviting readers to listen and learn animal noises to seek spiritual consolation in the jargon of birds or to identify with the speaking wolf create the conditions for an assertion of human exceptionalism even as they simultaneously invite readers to question such forms of control by asking what it means for an animal to cry make noise or speak in french this book provides an

important resource for theorizing sound and animality in multilingual medieval contexts and for understanding the animal s role in the interpretation of the natural world
